Speaker Biographies



Dr. James Goertzen is Professor of Family Medicine and Assistant Dean of CEPD at the Northern Ontario School of Medicine and is an AMS Phoenix Fellow with a focus on supporting compassionate physician leadership development in Northern Ontario. Dr. Goertzen was awarded the 2016 Association of Faculties of Medicine of Canada Award for Outstanding Contributions to Faculty Development in Canada along with the 2013 Ian McWhinney Family Medicine Education Award for his unique contributions to family medicine education in Canada. Dr. Goertzen has a particular interest in supporting community based faculty with their further development as clinicians, educators, and scholars and he has a passion for supporting the leadership development of others.



Dr. Catherine (Cathy) Cervin was appointed the first Vice Dean Academic, of the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) on January 1, 2018. She joined NOSM in 2011 as Associate Dean, Postgraduate Education. After training at the University of Toronto and Dalhousie University, Dr. Cervin began her career practicing family medicine in the Northern Ontario communities of Timmins and Sault Ste. Marie before pursuing an academic career in the Department of Family Medicine at Dalhousie University. Dr. Cervin received an Award of Excellence from the CFPC in 2010 and has held multiple positions with the CFPC including being a member of the Section of Teachers Executive, chair of the Board of Examiners, chair of the Honours and Awards Committee, and chair of the Foundation for Advancing Family Medicine.



Dr. Adam Moir completed his clerkship here in Huntsville and is a graduate of the family medicine residency program at NOSM. Based in Dryden, Ontario, his rural practice includes work in emergency medicine, long term care and primary care. Since graduating he's pursued special interests in ultrasound, patient safety and medical education. Dr. Moir spent 5 years as the Academic Coordinator for the NOSM family medicine residency program before becoming Medical Director, Faculty Development within the CEPD department at NOSM this past February. In 2012 he was awarded the Patient's Choice Award through the OMA and Patient's Choice Association. Dr. Moir was also voted NOSM Family Medicine preceptor of the year by West campus residents in 2012.



Dr. Tyler Johnston completed medical school at McMaster University and residency training in emergency medicine at Dalhousie University. As an emergency physician in Muskoka, Dr. Johnston is a passionate preceptor of the many learners who visit each year. He was awarded the special recognition award from the 2016 and 2018 Muskoka Clerkship students. Dr. Johnston is responsible for establishing Huntsville's simulation lab. He worked with NOSM and the Huntsville Physicians LEG to launch the program and continues to recruit and train facilitators, acquire equipment, and write cases for this initiative. His knowledge of and dedication to simulation teaching have been significant contributors to the success of this program. Dr. Johnston also has a Master's in Public Health from Harvard University.
